#### **ANZACA Life Members**

At the ANZACA 2018 Annual General Meeting, two new life members of the association were announced: Professor Helen Nicholson and Associate Professor Christopher Briggs. Congratulations to both Helen and Chris on this well-deserved recognition. They join Life Members Professor Stephen Carmichael and Professor Colin Wendell-Smith (dec). #### Professor Helen Nicholson BSc Hons, MB ChB, MD (Bristol)

Professor Helen Nicholson is the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (External Engagement) and Professor of Anatomy at the University of Otago. Prior to taking up the role of DVC she was the Dean of the Otago School of Medical Sciences. Helen graduated with an MBChB and BSc Hons from the University of Bristol and practiced medicine for several years before returning to undertake doctoral studies and pursuing an academic career in the Department of Anatomy at Bristol.

She moved to New Zealand in 2000 to take up a Chair in Anatomy. She has research interests in the areas of clinical anatomy, reproductive biology and medical education and these have led to numerous publications as well as production of the television documentaries "Donated to Science" and "Practising Medicine".

Helen was involved in the formation of ANZACA and was elected the inaugural president in October 2004. In 2009, Helen was elected to the Executive of the International Federation of Associations of Anatomists where she has held the role of Editor of Plexus.





#### Dr Christopher A. Briggs Dip Ed (Exeter) BSc, MS, PhD (Oregon)

On completing his PhD in 1974, Chris taught at the University of Oregon for 15 months and in 1975 was appointed to a lecturing position at the University of Melbourne, promoted to Associate Professor in 2004. He was initially a member of staff of the Department of Human Movement Studies, transferring to the Department of Anatomy in 1981, retiring from the Department of Anatomy and Neuroscience in 2017.

His major areas of research and scholarship have included musculoskeletal structure and function and in the development of Anatomedia, a modular multimedia-based project for teaching and learning anatomy. Chris is one of four principal authors on this project. During his University career Chris supervised several PhD and MSc candidates as well as

Honours and Masters Preliminary students. From 1991 until 2015 he held a sessional appointment in forensic anthropology at the Victorian Institute of Forensic Medicine and was Honorary Associate Professor in the Department of Forensic Medicine at Monash University. His publications extend across multiple fields, including medical education, anatomy and forensic anthropology/pathology. Chris was involved in teaching anatomy to a broad range of undergraduate students in Science, Biomedicine, Dentistry and Physiotherapy, and also taught in the Medical program. From 2011-2017 he coordinated the Graduate Diploma in Surgical Anatomy at Melbourne.

Externally, Chris was a guest lecturer at LaTrobe University, RMIT University, the University of Otago and James Cook University as well as external examiner at several institutions both in Australia and overseas. He was Vice President of ANZACA from 2008-10 and President from 2010-12, and presented at many of the annual conferences.

Chris continues to be active in the profession, holding a number of roles including Professor of Anatomy, School of Medicine, Deakin University (part time); Honorary Fellow & Associate Professor, Department of Anatomy & Neuroscience, University of Melbourne; Adjunct Associate Professor, Department of Forensic Medicine, Monash University; Visiting Associate Professor, College of Medicine & Dentistry, James Cook University

## Invitation to participate in a survey: perceptions of academic faculty regarding altmetrics

Jessica Byram, Kirsten Brown, Adam Wilson, and Michelle Lazarus are beginning a study to assess general perceptions of medical education academic faculty regarding altmetrics. Altmetrics or 'alternative metrics' are non-traditional metrics that cover not just citation counts, but also downloads, social media shares (e.g, Twitter, Academia.edu, Mendeley), and other measures of the impact of research outputs. These measures are gathered automatically by computer programs in order to provide a measure of one's reach in the academic and public spheres.

Our goal is to gain better understanding of what extent certain factors (e.g., primary professional role, research focus, frequency of social media use, etc.) influence how academics rate the absolute and comparative value of altmetrics.

All data collected from the survey will be anonymous. At the end of the survey you will be asked to provide your email address if you agree to participate in a follow-up interview. We will analyse the results and report the findings at future professional meetings. This survey has been examined and the study deemed exempt by the Institutional Review Board at Indiana University, study #1907014142.
