ANZACA Conference 3–5dec 2018 Townsville

Hi to our membership.

You might have felt a bit bombarded with emails of late regarding membership renewals via our new website, and while I hope this process has been smooth for most of you, I know there have been a few glitches along the way for some of you. I would like to thank you all for your patience with this and hope that you are pleased with our progress on the site. I have felt somewhat overwhelmed with the development process, having never done something like this before and now having created large parts of the site I have learned a lot of new skills along the way! I know Jamie Chapman has prepared an article about the website so I will not steal all of his thunder, but one of the things that you don't see is all of the background to the site and I want to thank a few people in particular for their involvement in setting this up.

We can now link payments directly to our bank accounts (in Australia and New Zealand) via an intermediary organization (Stripe) that also has two accounts! Our two Treasurers (Steph Woodley and Ian Johnson) have been doing some great work in the background on Stripe. We have also set-up a GSuite account that allows us to have generic passwords (e.g. president@anzaca.org) that we can retain over time on the website and just change who it directs to from time to time – thanks to Ian for helping set this up as well. While the Takeflight team (and Jonny in particular) have done a fantastic job in setting up the site, providing training and troubleshooting, I would also like to thank Jamie for his role in getting a lot of the content on the site. By the time you read this newsletter, Takeflight will also have set-up another intermediary (ti.to) to handle our conference registrations as well. There is still some work to be done on the site, but hopefully by the time I see you all again at the conference most of it will be pretty final.

Speaking of the conference, Monika Zimanyi and her local team at JCU have been doing a lot of work to set up our <u>conference</u> for December and the conference subcommittee has had a number of meetings during the year. Again, there is more to see on the website and in this newsletter, but it will be great to experience our first joint conference with the Australasian Society for Human Biology – see you all in December!

Lastly, I would like to encourage members to think about nominating for ANZACA Council. ANZACA 2018 Conference

James Cook University, Townsville, Australia

The conference this year will start on Sunday the 2nd of December at "The Quarterdeck" for 5-7 pm Welcome Event.

The conference will run from the 3rd - 5th of December at "The Science Place" at James Cook University, Townsville.

We will have two wonderful keynote speakers on each day of the conference this year, Professor Simon Parson will be presenting "Practical Anatomy: the challenge of engaging all of our students" and Associate Professor Danielle Royer will discuss "Variation: Anatomical constant, clinical imperative, educational dilemma". On Tuesday evening we will enjoy a beautiful meal at "The Touch of Salt" restaurant in the heart of *Townsville* City, the perfect location for dinner, a glass of something you fancy and catching up with friends.



On Wednesday, the scientific session in the morning will include presentations from delegates from both the Australasian Society of Human Biology (ASHB) and ANZACA to highlight the overlap in interests between these two groups. Those attending both conferences will be given a discount from both associations on confirmation of registration.

Following the scientific session on Wednesday, ASHB and ANZACA delegates are welcome to learn about "Anatomy teaching for science and medical students: ideas and innovations", "Incorporating evidence-based strategies for learning in your classroom" and "Active learning tips and tricks" in the education-based workshops. We will run a number of research focussed workshops simultaneously on "Pitching and publishing your research strategically" and "Tweet your research".






Please invite your faculty colleagues, graduate students, and postdoctoral fellows to take part as well.

ANZACA has a new home on the Web – ANZACA.org

For many of us, our first contact with ANZACA was via its website (anzaca.otago.ac.nz). Learning how to apply for membership, finding out when the next conference was or how to submit an abstract, or even finding a job, the ANZACA website was the place to go. Our former President Phil Blyth spent years and many, many hours developing, maintaining and updating the ANZACA website. To spread this burden and hopefully reduce much of the work for our Treasurers, we decided to update and move our website to a new home – you can now find us, if you haven't already, at ANZACA.org.



This process involved the Website Subcommittee investigating a number of web design companies in Australia and New Zealand, calling for quotes based on our current website needs – namely, a new domain, an easily discoverable presence on the Web, information about the Association, how to become a member and pay membership fees, and, importantly, information on the upcoming and/or past conferences.

takeflight, a digital creative studio based in Hobart, Tasmania, were soon identified as a front-runner in this exploration. takeflight had successfully produced great looking, modern websites for a number of local companies, including the University of Tasmania and the Australian Labor Party. The Subcommittee met with takeflight several times before the full Council met with them and a decision was made to proceed with this design studio.

The subcommittee then met with the web designers several times so that the studio could get an understanding of what ANZACA wanted to represent to the users of its website in terms of our mission, vision and our values – we chose inclusivity, academic integrity, acting ethically, a place for networking and connection, collaboration and professional development. Over the course of the next month or two, *takeflight* developed the website and received much feedback from the subcommittee and the Council. Our first priority was giving our members an opportunity to renew membership.



Membership

As part of the website development, membership renewals could now be paid by credit card through the website, dealt with behind the scenes through a system called Stripe, with only a minimal monthly and per transaction cost (to the Association, not the member). As we were establishing a new membership database through the website, new and returning members have been asked to complete an application-like web-form. Following this, renewal should be a much less involved task, relying upon your email address in the future to simply renew your membership.

After development of the membership renewal area, the rest of the website could then be populated.

With a Welcome page, Programme, Abstract Submission information and submission page, Accommodation information, Registration, Workshops, Invited Speakers information and links to past ANZACA conferences, it's a highly populated area of the website.
